RENEWABLE HEATING AND FUEL ALTERNATIVES COMBAT CLIMATE CHANGE AND RISING ENERGY PRICES

• Operate the appliance and burn fuel in accordance with the appliance manufacturer instructions.

PLANT OF THE MONTH - LAVANDULA ANGUSTIFOLIA, LAVENDER

No summer would be complete without Lavender. This low maintenance perennial is the epitome of a quintesential English country garden and is incredibly easy to look after. Introduced to the UK by the Romans, lavender originates from North Africa and the Mediterranean. It favours full sun, poor well-drained soil, and loathes being waterlogged.

This stunning perennial will shine for years with the help of a bit of pruning but eventually the shrug will get woody and need replacing. Popular English lavenders are Hidcote, Mustead and Folgate, all strongly scented vibrant hues and hardy to temperamental English weather. Lavandula dentata and stoechas, French and Spanish lavender, are not as hardy as their English cousin.

There is always the summer quandary - cut the flowers to dry and keep or leave them growing for the pollinators? If you can't make your mind up then do a mixture of both!

Lavenders essential oil promotes wellbeing, reduces anxiety and stress. its uplifting properties can help with depression, relieve headaches and its antibacterial qualities soothe insect bites and minor burns. Lavender's edible flowers are often used in cakes, icing and brewed for tea.

Having trouble sleeping? Place a few drops of lavender oil on your pillow and be sure of a restful nights sleep.

Lavender is used in everything from soaps to shampoos. Its antiseptic and antiinflammatory properties have been utilised medicinally since ancient times and this fragrant herb is a stalwart of aromatherapy; prized by the Romans, Greeks, Egyptians, Arabs and Phoenicians. Containing around 100 phytochemicals, Lavender really is an incredibly versatile herb.

Note: lavender contains linlool and linalyl acetate which is toxic to cats, dogs and horses if ingested, with greatest potency in lavender's essential oil so keep it away from furry friends.

CLEEVE PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

Council Meetings: Meetings are now held face to face on the 2nd Tuesday of each month (except August and December when no meetings are held).

All meetings will be held in Cleeve Village Hall in accordance with any Covid-19 regulations current at that time.

Details of meetings, agendas and minutes continue to be published on our website. You can access our website at <u>www.cleeveparishcouncil.co.uk</u>

At the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council Ronnie Morley was re-elected as Chair with Ben Whistance being our Vice Chair.

Your other Councillors are Hilary Burn, Marianne Pitman, George Stringer and Geoff Pritchard.

Speed Limit reduction on Cleeve Hill Road: We are delighted to report that the work to install a 30 mph limit on Cleeve Hill Road is now scheduled to start on 24 June. There is no plan to close the road but residents will be advised of the dates when work will be completed and stop/go boards may be used as appropriate.

Traffic Strategy for Cleeve: A lively discussion took place at the Annual Parish meeting on the subject of traffic and we intend to issue a village wide survey shortly to gauge residents concerns and how these may be addressed. This will be available on line, Facebook and also via paper copies shortly.

Allotments: Many years ago there were a small number of allotments available in Cleeve. We have had an email from a local resident expressing interest in taking an allotment on. This is likely to be a lengthy process to investigate viability, but we would be like to hear from any residents who may also be interested. Please note anyone interested must be a Cleeve resident.

We have had some interest expressed but still are short of the number required. So, if you are interested then please email me at cleeveparishcouncil@hotmail.co.uk or call 07932 191964.

Parking issues in Cleeve: It seems that the issues around parking continue to present a challenge and it would be very helpful if, in the first instance, any illegal parking is reported to North Somerset via <u>https://forms.n-somerset.gov.uk/ad/form/parking illegally#/1</u>

It is important to remember that, under the Road Traffic Act 1991, parking was decriminalised and civil enforcement of car parking regulations, is now carried out by civil enforcement officers operating on behalf of North Somerset Council rather than by the Police.

There have also been instances of parking on Pound Green itself and we wish to make it clear that this is completely unacceptable.

CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) Monies: The Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) is a new way of collecting financial contributions from developments towards the provision of infrastructure required to support growth in North Somerset. It has been in place since January 2018 and North Somerset Council CIL charges are based on a tariff of rates that have been set through public consultation and examination by the Planning Inspectorate.

Town and Parish Councils in North Somerset will receive a proportion of the CIL funds collected from developments in their Town or Parish.

In Cleeve we have received a payment relating to the re-development of the former Lord Nelson site.

The CIL Regulations state that a Town/Parish Council must use CIL receipts passed to it in accordance with Regulation 59A or 59B to support the development of the local council's area, or any part of that area, by funding:

(a) the provision, improvement, replacement, operation or maintenance of infrastructure; or

(b) anything else that is concerned with addressing the demands that development places on an area.

Cleeve Parish Council are consulting the community on any ideas they may have for projects. The ideas must be

a) For the benefit of the community.

b) No major infrastructure projects.

c) Projects up to a value of £5,000.

We will also publish this request on our Facebook page and be available to discuss at parish "surgeries" when these re-commence. We will also review any issues which may arise now that the new development is operational.

Air Quality Monitoring: In liaison with North Somerset Council we are undertaking Air Quality Monitoring particularly on the A370 in the area around the Tout's development. We therefore have a reference point ahead of the site being operational and this will continue now that the site is operational.

Dog Poo!! Although most dog owners act responsibly there are still examples of instances of dog poo not always being picked up. Whilst this is, of course, anti-social it also is worth reminding dog owners that North Somerset Council have published local Public Space Protection Orders (PSPOs).

The orders state that if you are in charge of a dog you must as a minimum:

- keep your dog(s) under close control at all times
- carry a poo bag
- bag it and bin it please don't leave bags hanging in trees or bushes

keep your dog(s) out of children's play areas.

So how can we all do our bit to help turn things around?

Help is at hand – in the form of a new free app called at <u>https://poopersnooper.app/get-started</u>

• Pooper Snooper lets you highlight the problem of dog fouling wherever you are and puts dog fouling on the map! The app also allows you to record and find the location of bins so that it's easier than ever to find where to dispose of your doggy deposits.

• Communities can use this to highlight and monitor problematic areas and it is hoped that the data will better enable authorities to act, for example, by providing extra and/or better placed bins or by enabling the efforts of over-stretched dog wardens to be better targeted.

Keep Cleeve Tidy: Our Village Orderly, Caroline, does a great job in keeping the village litter free (although this is often an uphill task!). We would be interested to hear if there are any areas of the village which you feel need any special attention at any time. TIPS FROM CLEEVE NURSERY

Feed rose bushes. Spread a handful or two of Toprose fertiliser around the plants and lightly hoe it in. Remove dead flowers and the tip of each shoot to encourage a strong new shoot to grow. This will give you a good show later.

Prune Climbing and Rambling roses by cutting out old shoots that have flowered [and weak ones that haven't]. Cut back hard to encourage new shoots to appear. These new shoots will carry next years' flowers.
