ALL ABOUT BEES- NOVEMBER 2021

The bees are starting to slow down for the winter, the rainy and cold days will keep them in the hive. The colony will reduce in numbers, from 60,000 at their largest to 20,000 or less over winter. A summer worker bee will live for, on average, 6 weeks while the winter bees may live from October to March. Summer bees spend the first 3 weeks in the hive, cleaning, caring for the brood, looking after the queen, guarding the hive entrance or converting nectar to honey ready for storing. Then they will spend 3 weeks flying from the hive to collect nectar and pollen. While the winter bees will spend most of their time huddled in the hive, collectively keeping the colony warm, they might not work as hard but they need to be healthy and strong to take the colony through to the next year. In comparison a queen may live for 5 years.

ON OUR FARMS

Work on the farm doesn't stop for Christmas but often it gets done earlier so the farmer and staff can enjoy a bit of a more relaxed day. All the jobs done on a daily basis are still done to make sure the animals have all they need. Plenty of food, water and clean, warm beds. As with everything in life, things sometimes go wrong on a farm and often it's at the most inconvenient time. One Christmas Day afternoon it was my turn to check the pigs. I took my two daughters to help. When we arrived we found four hundred pigs all mixed together and outside their pens. They took ages to sort out and we got quite smelly doing it! Tea was a bit later than planned that day.

Do you know dairy farmers are cow chiropodists? Just the same as humans, cows need to be able to walk properly without any discomfort. The farmer needs to make sure their feet are in tip top condition. To ensure this, the farmer checks the sole of each one of the cows feet at least once a year. The hoof is lifted, washed off and a visual inspection done. If the hoof is overgrown, it is trimmed just like we cut our toe and finger nails. If there is any bruising or damage to the sole of the hoof it is investigated to make sure it isn't causing any harm to the cow. If it is, the farmer will see if the problem can be cured by them. If not, the vet is called in. Whatever the course of action it is really important the cows feet are kept in perfect condition.

There doesn't seem to be a lot of work being done in the fields through the middle of winter but look closely and you might see someone in the field hedge trimming. Hedges aren't trimmed just to make the countryside look pretty. They need to be trimmed to ensure they keep their shape, provide a stock proof barrier and provide habitat and food for wild animals. New Year's Day would be a great day to have a walk in our local countryside and see what different species of wild animals and birds you can see eating the fruits and berries in the hedgerow. Happy New Year. Here's to a great 2022.



CLEEVE PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

We hope that you are all continuing to keep safe and well as we adapt to a new "normal".

We would like to take this opportunity to wish you all a very Happy and healthy Christmas and 2022.

Council Meetings: There are no further meetings this year but our first meeting of 2022 will be held on 11 January 2022 when we will be considering our budget for next year.

Meetings are now held face to face on the 2nd Tuesday of each month (except August and December when no meetings are held).

All meetings will be held in Cleeve Village Hall in accordance with any Covid-19 regulations current at that time.

Details of meetings, agendas and minutes continue to be published on our website. You can access our website at www.cleeveparishcouncil.co.uk

CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) Monies: The Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) is a new way of collecting financial contributions from developments towards the provision of infrastructure required to support growth in North Somerset. It has been in place since January 2018 and North Somerset Council CIL charges are based on a tariff of rates that have been set through public consultation and examination by the Planning Inspectorate.

Town and Parish Councils in North Somerset will receive a proportion of the CIL funds collected from developments in their Town or Parish.

In Cleeve we have received a payment relating to the re-development of the former Lord Nelson site.

The CIL Regulations state that a Town/Parish Council must use CIL receipts passed to it in accordance with Regulation 59A or 59B to support the development of the local council's area, or any part of that area, by funding:

(a) the provision, improvement, replacement, operation or maintenance of infrastructure; or

(b) anything else that is concerned with addressing the demands that development places on an area.

Cleeve Parish Council are consulting the community on any ideas they may have for projects. The ideas must be

a) For the benefit of the community.

b) No major infrastructure projects.

c) Projects up to a value of £5,000.

We will also publish this request on our Facebook page and be available to discuss at parish "surgeries" when these re-commence. We will also review any issues which may arise once the new development is operational in Spring 2022.

Review of parking/speed restrictions in Cleeve: As a Parish Council we fought hard to define, design, fund and seek agreement for the existing 30mph plans for Cleeve Hill Road. It is incredibly disappointing that we now face a delay on its implementation.

Our District Councillor, Steve Hogg, has been in discussion with Mike Solomon and Highways at North Somerset Council on this regularly. Steve has now been informed that all Parish Councils are to be given a published report showing all programmed works on it with timescales. This report will confirm that the Cleeve scheme is still on the schedule and that the scheme will be implemented in the 2022/2023 financial year.

We have received details of a survey carried out by some residents of Cleeve Hill Road which suggests that the scheme should be scrapped and a 20mph scheme should be pursued.

Given all the work already completed it is felt that, at this stage, the agreed scheme should proceed as this would mean that there would be nothing in place until we could design and fund an alternative and would certainly lead to even more delays.

There have also been issues with contractors for the Lord Nelson site development parking in Millier Road and this has been taken up on our behalf by our PCSO Julie. Julie has had discussions with the site manager and contracts manager and also with Jonathan Tout.

We have also been in touch with North Somerset Council who have also made representations to Tout's.

It seems that the issues are improving but it would be helpful if, in the first instance, that any illegal parking is reported to North Somerset via

It is important to remember that, under the Road Traffic Act 1991, parking was decriminalised and civil enforcement of car parking regulations, is now carried out by civil enforcement officers operating on behalf of North Somerset Council rather than by the Police.

At our November meeting it was resolved to hold a meeting in 2022 (probably our Annual Parish Meeting) where discussions will be held on formulating a strategy to cover the whole of Cleeve and review speed limit options, parking, traffic calming and any other suggestions which are put forward.

This meeting would include our District Councillor, Steve Hogg, plus representatives of North Somerset Council and the Police.

Air Quality Monitoring: We are currently in discussions with North Somerset to

undertake Air Quality Monitoring particularly on the A370 in the area around the Lord Nelson/Tout's development. This would give us a reference point ahead of the site being operational.

Bristol Airport: Bristol Airport Public Inquiry has now concluded and the date for announcement of the decision has not yet been set but is expected before the end of January 2022.

The Queen's Green Canopy: The Queen's Green Canopy (QGC) is a unique tree planting initiative created to mark Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee in 2022 which invites people from across the United Kingdom to "Plant a Tree for the Jubilee." We are planning for Cleeve to be involved by planting a new tree on Pound Green.

Alongside this we have been advised that under the Local Authority Treescapes Funding Scheme (via the Forestry Commission) we are able to secure two trees. These will be a Hawthorn and a Liquid Amber one of which will be planted under The Queen's Green Canopy scheme and the other as part of an anonymous commemoration by 2 Cleeve residents.

BT Payphone Box on Pound Green: As you may be aware, we still have a BT payphone on Pound Green and this had a number of broken panes of glass replaced in late September.

I am very disappointed to report that more damage was inflicted on the box in October. This is totally unacceptable vandalism.

BT have again repaired the damage but if you become aware of any further vandalism please report this via 101.

Dog Poo!! Although most dog owners act responsibly there are still examples of instances of dog poo not always being picked up. Whilst this is, of course, anti-social it also is worth reminding dog owners that North Somerset Council have published local Public Space Protection Orders (PSPOs).

The orders state that if you are in charge of a dog you must as a minimum:

keep your dog(s) under close control at all times

- carry a poo bag
- bag it and bin it please don't leave bags hanging in trees or bushes
- keep your dog(s) out of children's play areas.

Keep Cleeve Tidy: Our Village Orderly, Caroline, does a great job in keeping the village litter free (although this is often an uphill task!). We would be interested to hear if there are any areas of the village which you feel need any special attention at any time. 'MEDIEVALS AND MODERNS IN CONVERSATION'

A New Community Role for Brockley Church !

St Nicholas Church in Brockley is a hidden gem, dating back to medieval times with parts going back much further into unrecorded history. It is still an active place of worship and holds occasional services but is largely unused other than by occasional visitors and tourists. Although just over the border in Brockley, many residents in Cleeve regard 'St Nicks' as their local church.

The newly launched 'Gather In' project is using Brockley as a pilot study to find new uses for historic churches that draw inspiration from how they were used by their communities in the past. In addition to use for education and social activity it is hoped that 'St Nicks' will be available as a meeting place and for outreach groups who can use a slightly unusual venue full of history and charisma. The project is run jointly by the Churches Conservation Trust, Supersum (the innovation agency), Bristol University and the Friends of Brockley Church. Initially there will be seven weekly meetings lasting an hour running up to Christmas with the title 'Medievals and Moderns in Conversation' (see dates below). These will discuss the role of the medieval church in local life and to ask how we can reinvent this in modern society to best utilise the wonderful community asset that the church can provide.

There will be one meeting a week from now until Christmas hosted by Dr. Tim Senior, of Supersum. Tim and his colleagues are incredibly knowledgeable about how medieval buildings were used and the first get together quickly became a question and answer session that was absolutely fascinating. We were also introduced to a new interactive voice recorder that can be easily used by visitors and local people to record memories relating to the building and thoughts on how they would like to see it used in the future.

Tim's review of the inaugural meeting was as follows: The medieval rural church was absolutely integral to village life. Whilst Christian teaching would have been central to its work, it would also have been a social service, a meeting place, law courts and the centre of creative, artistic (and even commercial) activities. What lies behind this is the role parish churches played in mobilising people not as individuals but as a community. Through the organisation of the parish church, a community could raise revenue from lands and bequests that would support church building and the 'divine services' – but also support local infrastructure and provide credit, poor relief and basic education. In this way, much of what we consider today to be divided between religious, secular and commercial worlds would have been bound together through the Church and its parish to the wider benefit of the community according to its needs: surely a model we can reinvent for today?

Starting in 2022, The Friends of Brockley Church hope to run regular lectures, events and social activities in the Church and make it available for others to use for community activities. While we don't want to start selling chickens in the vestry, the aim is to get people back into the building so that it can fulfil its original purpose as a social and community hub and a centre where groups can book space to hold functions and activities thus getting the church used again on a regular basis. There is access to toilet facilities nearby and a small kitchenette is being installed so that the church can provide basic home comforts. It will still be used for worship and services as before.

TIPS FROM CLEEVE NURSERY

Wash pots and seed trays so that they are clean and ready for sowing to start soon. Mice and rats will move inside for warmth and shelter so check greenhouses and sheds and take precautions where you have seed, vegetables and bulbs stored.

Forcing of established rhubarb crowns can be started towards the end of the month, pack with straw or straw/manure and cover with a forcing pot or upturned dustbin.

Provide clean water for birds especially in frosty weather.

Feed the birds regularly so that when a cold snap comes they know where to get food easily.

PLANT OF THE MONTH DECEMBER - HELLEBORES

Hellebores, also known as the Lenten rose or Christmas rose, thrive in part shade, well-drained, moist conditions. Happy in most soil types but lean towards alkaline, they range in colour from white through to purple with single, double, speckled or picotee dark-edged petals.

Helleborus orientalis, H.niger, H. x hybridus, H.viridis, H. argutifolius and of course stinking hellebore, H. foetidus are all commonly found in gardens. These evergreen perennials are a great source of nectar for early emerging bees and good news, deer and rabbits avoid them!

As new growth appears towards Christmas, cut back all the old leathery leaves, as this will expose the beautiful new blooms.

Hellebores are low maintenance and stress-free but they can be susceptible to Hellebore leaf spot, caused by the fungus *Microsphaeropsis hellebori*, which can cause brown spots on stems, flowers and leaves. Remove any affected material.

Hellebores easily self-seed so don't be surprised if you discover lots of hellebore babies around your mother plant. Borders can get quickly over crowded so dig up the plantlets and pot on for friends or your local charity plant sale.

Toxic if eaten so wear gloves and ensure pets don't nibble.

Celebrate the festive season with early flowering *Helleborus niger* 'Christmas Carol.' Beautiful white blooms flower from December to February, height a petite 30cm so perfect for a pot.
